Dear Third Family,

In his lovely little book The Radical Disciple, John Stott points out that only three times in the entire New Testament are followers of Jesus called "Christians." The much more prevalent designation for those who follow Jesus in the New Testament is "disciple." I sometimes wish that the word "disciple" had won out over "Christian" in the centuries of the church's development. Although both terms indicate a relationship with Jesus, "disciple" has a more robust indication that those who are in relationship with Jesus not only believe in him but are "under the discipline" of his teaching and directives.

The gospel is not just the minimal entrance requirements for getting into heaven when you die. It is also a radical call to a new way of life in a new Kingdom. Jesus came not only to atone for our sins through his saving death, but also to announce a new Kingdom over which he is King (Mark 1:15, Luke 8:1). He now calls those who believe in him to follow him and re-order their lives around him and his reign.

This spring we are in a new section of Luke examining the "Call of the King," asking the question, "What does it mean for us to follow Jesus in this time, in this place, with our particular life circumstances?" In my role as pastor, I often get a front row seat to the difficult choices that many of you make in your commitment to follow Jesus even when it is costly. Here are just a few situations I've observed from our own members:

- A man who lost his job because when he was asked to make questionable ethical decisions, he refused, and in turn was terminated.
- A high school student who is one of the only Christians in her extracurricular group at school, and is often teased, yet has loved her peers with an extraordinary heart of kindness and humility.


These are just a few of many situations that have challenged me personally to examine my own journey of following Jesus. What is common to each of these people is their allegiance to Jesus and their willingness to accept the costly aspects of following him, not just the demands of Jesus that suit them.

As we continue to hear the call of Jesus, I invite you to examine your own life and consider how Jesus is calling you freshly to follow him. What might he be asking you to give up? What personal character flaw or besetting sin might he be calling you to work on? What risks is he calling you to take? What costly action might be required of you and your family to follow Jesus faithfully?


Above all, let's remember that we take up our cross to follow Jesus not to earn anything from him or to gather up brownie points in heaven. Everything necessary for our salvation has already been accomplished for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus. So why do we take up our cross for Jesus? Because he has taken up his own cross for us, and because there is no better life than the one spent following him.



THE CALL OF THE KING: A REFLECTION ON OUR VISUAL

THE CALLING OF SAINT MATTHEW (Caravaggio)

Each of our series of sermons on the Gospel of Luke is represented by an image capturing a pivotal moment in the story. As we explore the power and costs of following Jesus in "The Call of the King," our image is Caravaggio's "The Calling of Saint Matthew," painted 1599-1600 for the San Luigi dei Francesi church in Rome.

The painting (roughly 10½ feet square) depicts the incident described in Luke 5:7 and Matthew 9:9, when Jesus identifies a tax collector known as both Levi and Matthew, inviting



him to become his disciple. Caravaggio shows Matthew as a middle-aged man with a red beard, sitting with a motley crew of four other men, dressed in the fashion of Cavavaggio's own time and looking like the card-players, musicians, and other shady characters that so often appear in the painter's work. Jesus enters from the right with the apostle Peter and motions across the room with a gesture that both singles Matthew out and calls him to get up and follow—a gesture that is reinforced by the beam of sun illuminating the table and the tax collector, himself.

To the outcasts gathered there it seems an unlikely place for a rabbi to show up—a strange place for the light of God to break in. In fact, Matthew seems to be caught in the act of saying "Who, me? "Surely you mean someone else!" But Jesus did mean him, and Christ's gaze is direct and unwavering. We may also find ourselves to be unlikely or unwilling disciples, but Jesus calls to each of us, too, wherever we are, and invites us to walk in his footsteps. In that moment, we must answer the same question Matthew faces in this painting: "Will I follow Jesus, the King?"

I was asked how I'm responding to the call of Christ in the hard places of my life.

Candidly, the question had me stumped. I tend to think of "the call of Christ" as something that comes down and inserts itself into the flow of my life, and my job is to (a) perceive it and (b) follow it.

But that's not how my life really works. It seems to me that the call of Christ is, instead, woven into the very fabric of my life. It's there all the time, part of my DNA.

And so, it doesn't seem to me that the call of Christ has led me into any particularly hard times in my life. Unless you mean my ongoing commitment to be kind to my wife, instead of taking out my frustrations on her. That's hard. Not because of her, but because of me.

And it doesn't feel like the call of Christ has put me out of step with the people around me. Unless you mean how I work hard to resist my consumerist tendencies. But that feels like it's just who I am.

What IS helpful and meaningful for me is to look at how the hard times in my life help me to know Jesus better. To understand his character more deeply. For instance, Margarete and I have spent a LOT of time advocating on NIck's behalf. In school. With the insurance company. The legal system. At church.


And that helps me understand more deeply what it means that Christ is my Advocate. He pleads on my behalf. He put himself in harm's way to protect me. He's on my side, always. I know he's got my back.

Same thing with Nick's scars. With my suffering. The "hard places" in my life point me back toward Christ and his character ... when I pay attention.

And so far as being out of step with the people around me, I've come to understand that the people around me are hurting a lot more than I'd think just by looking at them. Including that guy who cut me off in traffic.

So rather than looking for Christ's call in my life, I look for Christ. Who says, "Follow me -- I've got your back."

MOSAIC SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY:

The Mosaic Scholarship Fund exists to help parishioners with scholarships to summer camps for kids with special needs, or to conferences, workshops, and continuing education classes involving issues around disabilities. The money is available for: 1) professionals, 2) parents or caregivers, and 3) children with disabilities.

Some examples of how the money could be used are:

- a professional workshop for a therapist or special education teacher from church who might otherwise not be able to attend due to limited finances from their organization or school
- a training workshop or conference on autism, ADHD, dyslexia, or education advocacy for a parent of a child with special needs
- Easter Seals summer camp, JCC specialty camp, or Unique Kids soccer camp for a child with a disability

Decision Making Principles:

- 1. Preference will be given to those active in Mosaic activities, then to church members and regular attenders, lastly to those outside the church.
- 2. Total amount that can be granted for a request is \$1000. Requests can be repeated in subsequent years.
- 3. Since funds are limited and there is value in personal investment, grants will be given at a percentage not to exceed 75% of the total cost of the request.

A subcommittee of the Mosaic Leadership Team will make decisions on requests.

Procedure for Application

Requests for funds should be made in writing to Kathy White, Associate Director of Family Ministries, and should include, if possible, a brochure or flyer describing the event, program, or camp, along with published costs for the program for which support is requested. Requests should be submitted by May 15th. Contact Kathy White with any questions: kathyw@thirdrva.org.


