

Jesus constantly tells stories. He tells stories about basic things of life that everyone could relate to: stories about farming, sowing seed, detecting weeds, reaping a harvest, paying wages, fishing, building, managing estates, judging in the law court, and so on. He tells stories about men and women, children, the poor and the rich, the outcast and the powerful. He tells real-life stories from the language of the people, things that everyone could immediately relate to.

What all of these stories have in common is that they have a double meaning. Parables are stories with two different levels of meaning. They are pointing to something. Jesus wants us to look beyond the story or event in order to see a greater story...the story about God and His kingdom, and the way His kingdom works in the world. Parables are like signposts pointing to a destination that is farther and greater than the signpost itself.

Why did Jesus tell stories?

Over a third of Jesus' teaching is in parables. The disciples asked him once, "Why are you talking in parables all the time?" Jesus responded in Mark 4:11-12. He told them, "The secret of the kingdom of God has been given to you. But to those on the outside everything is said in parables so that, 'they may be ever seeing but never perceiving, and ever hearing but never understanding; otherwise they might turn and be forgiven!"

What does this mean? The Jewish people were anticipating a Messiah King for a very long time. When Jesus showed up he was a very different kind of king than they were expecting. They wanted a king who would come with power, drive out the Romans, establish the kingdom of Israel and exalt them in power. But Jesus was not that kind of a King. As Jesus told these parables, he was offering an invitation to a different kind of Kingdom. He was inviting them to become a part of the Kingdom he was establishing and it was an altogether different kind of a kingdom than they had ever seen or experienced.

In this Kingdom the humble are lifted up and the poor are exalted, while the proud and the lofty are brought [Continued]

The wandering are sought out, the hungry are fed, the lost are found. In this Kingdom, God's love is showered on those who are totally undeserving, while those who think they are deserving are shut out.

Jesus is giving a radical new interpretation of how God is working in the world. As people heard these stories, they were shocked awake to the new reality of God's Kingdom in Jesus. In response, they were either brought to their senses and became a part of this new adventure, or their hearts were hardened and they refused to believe that this new story that Jesus was telling could possibly be true.

The same is true for us. These parables are not nice little bedtime stories with good morals at the end. They are meant to shock us and shake us awake out of our apathy and out of our boredom. They are meant to remind us that the Christian life is not just about coming to church on Sundays and reading your Bible and being a good moral person. Instead, the stories of Jesus teach us that the Christian life is about a secret, revolutionary movement of God in the world, and they are an invitation to every one of us to become a part of that movement.

From August 7 through September 4, we'll be looking at five parables from the Gospel of Luke. The stories are an invitation to discover what God's Kingdom is like and to become a part of it.

With hearts full of joy and gratitude, we bring you a mid-year report of God's faithfulness and provision for Third Church, demonstrated in your generosity during the first half of this year! Through the period ending June 30, the income of the church is greater than the budgeted amount and the expenses are less than those budgeted. The leadership of Third senses God's loving faithfulness in the finances of the church and longs for you to know it also. In the paragraphs that follow there are caveats to both the income and expense financial positions at mid-year, but nothing diminishes the grace received in the first 6 months of the year!

And our rejoicing is not predicated on just this financial grace, but on the Kingdom work it will accomplish. Your generosity places Third in a position to meet the challenges we set for ourselves last fall as we looked forward to 2016 and we saw God was on the move; knew he had prepared the way; and invited all those with willing hearts to join us in eagerly following.

The challenges were:

- To send greater support to our international mission partners: the 2016 budget reflects this!
- To take on new ministry initiatives: Jobs for Life and ADHD family ministry are happening!
- To sustain Third's ministry and growth with adequate staff: long-awaited Mission Pastor is hired!

We continue to seek God's leading in our ministries, our finances, our growth and our community.

Before we look at the mid-year numbers, here is a reminder about how Third's budget is developed. The historical trends in monthly giving (that follow a somewhat predictable pattern during the calendar year) are considered. To the extent possible, spending budgets are adjusted to align with the historical giving pattern, but in certain expense areas (i.e., personnel costs) the costs develop more evenly over the course of the year. As such, it is not unusual for Third Church to operate in an operating loss position for much of the year, given that monthly giving is more heavily concentrated in the last few months of the year. The details on the budget follow.

Through April 30 of this year, the offering income exceeded the budgeted amount by a total of \$57,500. This was a great encouragement as we watched the hearts of God's people respond to his generous grace to us through Christ. In May and June our offering income was less than the amounts budgeted for those months, but through June 30, offering income of \$1,332,000 remains ahead of budgeted giving by \$8,300.

Through June 30 of this year, Third's expenditures of \$1,410,000 were \$159,750 less than budget. While this gives us some cushion as we enter the summer months (when giving is historically less than the required amount to cover Third's expenses), we know this budgeted money is committed for mission and for major maintenance items and it will be spent. Still, we are very grateful to enter summer in this positive cash flow position!

We invite you to continue in your faithful giving through the second half of the year. Most importantly, join us in praising God for meeting our financial needs, just as he meets ALL our needs according to the riches of his glory in Jesus Christ!

How to "One Another" One Another in Jobs for Life

It is not hard to extol the virtues of the Jobs for Life program. The most common description is as follows: Jobs for Life is a "biblically-based job readiness program that teaches professional soft skills, resumes and interview techniques." Or, Jobs for Life is "a discipleship platform to help underserved men and women find jobs and experience life in Christ."

Both of these descriptions highlight the core purpose of the JFL program but the truth is, the real virtue of the program is relational...it lives out the "How to 'One Another' One Another" sermon series that Third is digging deep into this summer.

Each week, the One Another theme correlates with Jobs for Life: Living in Harmony with One Another, Confessing Your Sins to One Another, Forgiving One Another, Showing Hospitality to One Another, and so on. JFL is truly the foundation of being relational in a way that can seem messy and yet is so rewarding.

The greatest joy is when something that you never imagined was happening is revealed so unexpectedly...such as when a recent JFL graduate spoke these words at the June 8th graduation:



During the last week of June, 250 children and over 130 volunteers gathered for a week of Bible exploration, crafts, and fun at the *More Than Gold* Vacation Bible School! This Olympic-themed VBS was written by members of Third Church and focused on teaching 5 character traits to the children. We featured men and women from the Bible to help illustrate trust in God, endurance, focus, teachability, and commitment.

During VBS, the children bring in their offering money to support a special project. This year, we chose to build a library for the Anura School in Niger, West Africa. This school was started by World Horizons as an expansion of literacy programs and now provides a quality Christian education to over 400 students. We set a starting goal of \$6000 to purchase books for a library, including Bibles and Christian storybooks in French. **These generous children brought in over \$8500 to support this project!** We heard great stories of bake sales, lemonade stands, and even a car wash to raise money. We all look forward to hearing updates from the school in the future and seeing how they used this money to "run their race" and get a great education!
