LETTER FROM COREY

Someone from Third recently asked me, "What is this whole 'Parish thing' about again?" in a passing hallway conversation. In fact, I find myself fielding questions all the time about the change we are making toward a Parish model of ministry at Third. Below are some basic questions and answers that hopefully you will find helpful, but we also encourage you to continue asking questions in the months ahead. It's important we are all in this together as we seek to make this important shift.

What is the "Parish model" that you all keep talking about?

Beginning in January 2018, our congregation will be organized into eleven geographic areas called "Parish Areas." Each Parish Area comprises about 75-115 adult covenant partners of Third plus children and regular attenders. The Parishes are being formed geographically according to where people live, and every person at Third will be automatically incorporated into a Parish. (See diagram on the following page.)

The primary purpose of the Parish Area is to serve as a vehicle for connection and care. Each Parish Area will have a team of several deacons and shepherding elders who oversee the practical and spiritual care of all those within the Parish Area. The Parish Areas also serve as a way for visitors and regular attenders to quickly get connected with someone else in the church.

Each Parish Area will also have a collection of groups called "Parish Groups." Parish Groups can consist of about 15-20 adults plus children, generally the amount of people that can fit into a home. Parish Groups are completely voluntary mid-sized communities of people who are seeking to grow as disciples of Jesus together and reach out to and love their neighbors.

Why are we doing this?

We are doing this for two important reasons: community and mission. Regarding community, we want to make it easy for people to enter into relationships at Third, receive care and love in community, and grow as followers of Jesus with other believers. Regarding mission, we want to empower the people of Third to love their actual neighbors in all the many different neighborhoods all over Richmond where we live, so that the grace and goodness of Jesus can be more fully known.

Will the 100 or so people in a Parish Area meet together?

No, at least not in this first stage. There may be a time when large-scale Parish-wide events take place, but we don't foresee planning for that in the immediate future. Right now, the larger Parish area is being used to help direct our care and connection efforts.

What work is being done on Parishes behind the scenes right now?

Working Group 3 is still working diligently and prayerfully on the logistics and planning for Parishes. Our plan is to publicly launch the Parish model in January 2018, so currently we are working on finalizing the exact boundary lines of the Parishes, and organizing and equipping teams of deacons and shepherding elders for each Parish.

What about Parish Groups—I hear that some Parish Groups have already started. Is that true?

You're right! Some pilot groups are in place in certain areas to establish rhythms and give feedback on how things work for our launch in January. If you're interested in being a part of this process or want to see if there's a Parish Group in your neighborhood area, contact Beth Nichols (bethn@thirdrva.org).

When can I find out what Parish Area I'm in, who else is in it, and who the deacons and shepherding elders are that are leading my Parish Area?

Our goal, again, is launching the Parish model in January of 2018, so we're hoping all the details will be finalized and shared by then. As any maps are finished or leadership established before that time, we will share with you at that point—hopefully this fall!

What about my current small group? Are Parish Groups replacing existing small groups?

No. We are encouraging new people to join Parish Groups and will be seeking to start many more of them, but we know that different kinds of groups serve different purposes.

Will we keep having worship services on Sundays and Sunday morning classes?

Yes! Sunday morning will not look much different.

Who will be supporting this new structure on our staff?

We are currently searching for a new Pastor of Discipleship and Parish Ministry who will oversee this aspect of our church life. In addition, Tom Barila has been shifting his role to include support of the deacons and shepherding elders leading each Parish Area (in addition to Sunday morning discipleship), and Beth Nichols will be supporting the leaders and formation of the Parish Groups.

What can I do to be a part of this?

First, please pray! This is a big change and we need the Lord to build this—or else we labor in vain (Psalm 127). Pray that God would lead us to the right new pastoral leader, and that God would truly use this change to see people grow in Christ and come to know Christ.

Second, consider forming or being a part of a Parish Group. We will need many new leaders and people to get involved in these groups. Contact Beth Nichols if you are interested at Bethn@thirdrva.org.

MEET JUAN LEDON:

ANTIOCH CHURCH PLANTING RESIDENCY INTERN

We are very excited to announce the beginning of a new 2-year church planting residency program at Third. We are calling it the "Antioch Residency Program," because Antioch was the site of the first truly multicultural church as the gospel expanded out from Jerusalem (Acts 11-13). As Richmond and North America become more culturally diverse, this Residency Program has a special focus on reaching the new diverse populations of our metro Richmond region. Q: How do you pronounce your last name?

A: Not the way it's spelled! It's actually French and phonetically would be Ledone – with a long "o" sound.

Q: Where are you from originally?

A: Cuba! My family moved to Washington state when I was five years old. We didn't end up staying too long; over the next few years we lived in Idaho and New Jersey and then moved to Miami. I lived there for about 40 years!

Q: Tell us about your family!

A: I have been married to my wonderful wife, Silvia, for 32 years – we met in college! We have four children who now all live here in Richmond also: Lizette – 28, Gabriel – 26, Daniel – 22 and Elise – 19.

Q: So how did you come to be in Richmond?

A: In 2012 a very good friend was taking a sales manager job here and extended an offer for me to come work with him. After praying, we felt like God was leading us here, but just as we were arriving we became aware of the company's impending demise. We were in crisis mode, trying to decide whether to stay or go back, but God provided somebody in the church we had started visiting who extended hospitality to us for 3 months while we put things together here.

Q: What brought you to Third?

A: Corey! He attended a conference in Tennessee where he heard a speaker who is a friend of mine. Corey asked if he knew of anyone in the Richmond area that would be interested in church planting and he recommended me. We met for coffee several times, and as Corey unpacked his vision for Third, I felt there was a compatibility there – a connection in line with things he had in mind. That was in 2014.

Q: What are you hoping for in this Residency Program?

A: Richmond is a unique opportunity. It has newly forming Latino and immigrant communities that are barely on the radar here. My heart goes out to them. I'm an immigrant; I respect the challenges they have to overcome. I want to be part of an outreach effort to them, likely in a new non-traditional way by sharing the gospel where they live, not necessarily in the churchy traditional approach. I don't know what it will look like in the end, but I want to engage immigrants through the gospel, bringing them together in an effort to make them feel at home in a strange land.

Q: How can we be praying for you in this?

A: Thanks for asking, I need a lot of that! I pray for God's definition and clarity as we try to follow. His lead on developing what this internship will turn into. I would particularly ask for prayers that God will show me what He's doing here and how we can join Him.

LEADERSHIP UPDATE: JUNE

HERE'S WHAT HAPPENED AT THE MOST RECENT SESSION MEETING ON JUNE 27:

MEMBERSHIP CHANGES

- Lorraine Joseph died on June 6 and was removed from the roll of Covenant Partners.
- Baptism was approved for Hunter Brave Allen, son of Josh and Jessie Allen.

EAST END FELLOWSHIP

East End Fellowship (EEF) Transfer of Rights Resolution was approved. EEF now has its own tax exempt status, insurance, bank accounts, accounting firm, online giving, etc. and has become a separate incorporated entity. This action transfers the Q Street lease from Third to EEF.

Working Group 1 (Communicate our purpose)

Co-Chairs Val Kling and Mark Mendez offered a verbal presentation. WG1 has begun work with Kumveka (a communications strategy firm focusing on Christian organizations) to explore the implications of Third's vision and identity for branding, signage and communication, including consideration of the name of the church. This includes a comprehensive assessment of our context in Richmond, among other churches, and barriers that exist with our communication, the goal being that we may sharpen our communication to those who do not yet know Jesus Christ.

Working Group 2 (Staff and Session realignment) and Personnel Committee-

Jointly presented a motion on staff realignment, and the following changes in staff positions were approved for immediate implementation:

To facilitate Parish Ministry (approved in April, effective currently)

- 1. Hire a Pastor for Discipleship and Parish Ministry search is currently in process to hire as soon as possible.
- 2. Realign duties for Beth Nichols and Tom Barila for tactical support for Parish ministry and the new pastor.

Director of Adult Ministries —Tom will focus on support of the Parish Leadership Teams (shepherding elders and deacons). This includes oversight of the communication of and management of care ministry since a large part of it will happen in the Parish. The remainder of his time will be in continuing centralized ministry with Adult Discipleship and Men's Ministry.

Director of Connection Ministries — Beth will focus on the support of the Parish Groups and their leaders. She will continue with connection ministries and Women's Ministry.

Other Changes: (to be implemented immediately)

3. Change Associate Pastor for Congregational Care and Administration position to Executive Pastor – Ed Satterfield will focus responsibilities on leading staff and key leadership teams with Session and deacons; help manage yearly objectives, provide overall administration of the church's organization and maintain overall pastoral oversight for Care Ministries.

- 4. Add Care Ministry to the Director of Music and Worship position In order to reassign some of the care duties from Ed, we would add to John White's Job Description the responsibility for Senior Care.
- 5. Provide overall custodial oversight We have hired ServiceMaster as our new contract custodial service. Richard Womack is Third's sole facility employee and he will oversee the rest of the contract custodial team.
- 6. Decrease to one Finance Associate position We expect to end our work relationship with Sue Hendrickson in the finance department as she retires sometime this fall. Lynley Steadman, our Finance Accountant, will pick up Sue's part time duties. We greatly appreciate Sue and all she has contributed to Third for many years serving as Director of Finance before her recent stint part time.
- 7. College Ministry We have separated College Ministry from Young Adult Ministry. To better address ministry to our college students and support the College Ministry leadership team led by Karen Hayes and Andi Redmond, we approved the following staff changes:

Adjust Rick Hutton's job description to include oversight for College Ministry. Rick's role would focus on training, supporting and equipping the intern staff and volunteer leaders for College Ministry.

Hire an Intern to do the hands-on work of ministry. The position would run during the school year and could extend into the summer. The intern's responsibilities would focus effort in three ways: 1) supporting the efforts of the Anchors While Away ministry to connect Third members with students away at college and for summer activities and events, 2) develop relationships with University of Richmond students through our ministry partner connections the Center for Christian Study and InterVarsity, and 3) help develop Parish connections for U of R students.

Several other new positions were presented to be hired over the next 2 years that will be voted on at a later Session meeting. This represents the full staff realignment planning envisioned by Working Group 2.

SNEAK PEEK AT FALL CLASSES

The fall season at Third kicks off September 10! It's a great opportunity to check out one of our 10:00 a.m. Sunday School classes if you haven't already.

GOOD NEWS

This fall the Good News Class will be studying the book of Galatians, one of the key books of the New Testament. This class provides expository, inductive Bible teaching and discussion designed to help us to be transformed by the renewing of our minds (Romans 12:2). It is open to people of all ages and backgrounds.

REFLECTIONS ON THE REFORMATION

How did the Reformation happen? What does it mean for 21 st century Christians? Come see in our class as we walk among some giants that many know well (Martin Luther, John Calvin, and Martin Bucer), and some who are more obscure.

METAMORPHOSIS

We are a community seeking God's healing and wholeness for the brokenness in our lives and families through safe, authentic Christian relationships. This semester, we will be discussing "Unlocking Your Family Pattern: Finding Freedom from a Hurtful Past."

REVEAL

This fall, we will be studying the Acts of the Apostles. Our teaching team primarily uses expository Bible teaching to examine the scriptures. Their teaching is interactive and is underpinned by our Reformed heritage.

DOING GOD'S JUSTICE IN A HURTING WORLD

In this 8-week elective class, we'll explore the biblical foundations for "doing justice" that can be manifest in efforts to eliminate human trafficking and also in many other avenues.



- 5. Even though I mess up, God still loves me and will never leave me.


We had a great week full of amazing crafts, great music, and Bible teaching! And each summer, VBS chooses a mission project to support. With the help of our Mission Pastor, LJ Jaworski, we supported two mission partners, one local and one global. CrossOver Healthcare Ministry was our local partner, and our global partner was SAT-7, a satellite TV network, which is launching a 24/7 children's educational programming satellite this fall. The VBS gift to SAT-7 Academy is Third's first official gift to this ministry and will benefit children in the Middle East, many of whom are refugees. Through lemonade stands and car washes, daily offerings, donations from Pie 5 and Sweet Frog, T-shirt sales, plus donations from our church family and a match from Third's Missions Committee, we raised **over \$24,000 to be divided between SAT-7 and Crossover!**

SPORTS SKILLS CAMP

During the week of July 10-14, we held our 5th Annual Sports Skills Camp. The camp has combined the fun and excitement of great sports training in soccer, basketball, and kickball with the great news of the Gospel. Sponsored by Third Church, the Christian Arabic Church and Community West Church, this week offered time for children to build sports skills and to learn about Christian character building from skilled college athletes, local athletes, and Sports Outreach Institute athletes.

Sports Outreach Camp has been a great child outreach event. Of the 95 campers who registered, over half were friends and guests of Third! We also had an amazing group of volunteers— 25 strong! Although it was plenty hot during the camp, we enjoyed our time together and learned more about the love of Jesus.

My granddaughters have loved coming to Sports Camp the last two years! My daughter is thrilled to know her children are getting sports exposure as well as hearing the gospel from college students, whom they look up to. A win-win! I overheard my granddaughter in the back of the car one morning on our way to camp practicing the weekly Bible verse over and over.
