



If only I can get that job. If only I get that raise. If only my kid gets into that school. If only we get into a bigger home. If only... then my life would be different. Then things would be ok. Then all will be well.

It is a deeply universal human experience to perpetually seek after that which we believe will finally bring fulfillment. In her memoir "Drinking: A Love Affair," Caroline Knapp tells her story of battling anorexia and alcoholism for many years. She writes about how addicts like her delude themselves with false hopes.

"I lived by the words *if only* and I'd continue to do so for a decade. In my 20s the objects of desire were good jobs and thin thighs: if only I could write for a living I'd be happy; if only I were 5 or 10 pounds thinner my life would be different. In my 30s the focus would shift to men: if only I had a relationship, I thought. And then, months after meeting my boyfriend, if only the relationship were different, if only, if only..."

"If only" are words of longing. They are words that our hearts silently speak, pointing us toward whatever it is that we believe will make it all better.

In my own life, my "if only" has been about my personal and vocational success, reputation and approval, and a mythical image of what my life would look like as a successful pastor and leader. What is it for you?

THE FIRST WORDS OF JESUS in the gospel of John are a question: "What are you seeking?" (John 1:38). It is a question about our longings and our desires. Jesus wants to know what it is that we are after deep in our hearts. At our Ash Wednesday service this year, we all wrote on slips of paper the false objects of our seeking, those things other than Jesus that we believe that we need to satisfy our souls. Then, we brought those slips of paper to the table and dropped them in a firepit, asking God to burn away those things that falsely promise fulfillment.

This Easter Sunday, we'll be looking at one of the last questions Jesus asks in the gospel of John: "Who are you seeking?" (John 20:15). Notice that the question is nearly identical to the first question that Jesus asked, but now the *What* has been changed to a *Who*. Therein lies the key. In this subtle change, Jesus reveals that in all the "whats" we seek, we are actually after a "who": the risen King.

C.S. Lewis wrote that when you think the solution to your malaise is a new romantic partner, or a new house, or a new job to quell the inner sense of emptiness, you are chasing the wrong answers to the right question. Our desires our noble, given to us by God. But often they are misplaced, as we believe the wrong things will save and satisfy us. They never do. Lewis went on to say that if nothing in this world seems to satisfy you or assuage your longing, then you must actually be looking for something *outside of this world*. You are looking for the Who, not the what.

This Easter, look to the risen King, who alone can give the life that is truly abundant (John 10:10).


EASTER SUNDAY

This directory will provide all the same basic contact information as a paper directory but with some significant improvements. You'll be able to:


- Access it anywhere you have internet, either through an app on your phone or on your computer.

In May of 2018 a small team from The Christian Arabic Church (CAC) and Third Church traveled to Egypt to meet with Egyptian congregations with the aim of developing a sister-partnership between CAC, Third and a church in Egypt. And as we've shared with you—we found one! We hope in the future to take teams from Third and CAC together to travel to Egypt to work alongside them and encourage them in ministry as they serve in a setting where Christian evangelism is illegal and punishable. We also hope in the future to host church leaders from our sister-church El Sharabia at Third and CAC.

How did the concept of sister-partnerships begin? Tom Widmer, serving as Third's mission chairperson, led a group of global leaders in our presbytery and there the idea was birthed. Tom engaged The Outreach Foundation to help organize these partnerships through Cairo Seminary and as a result, several churches in our presbytery now have ongoing relationships in Egypt and travel there with their congregations.

Furthermore, one of the objectives that came out of the Strategic Planning working groups was the conviction to commit more deeply in our relationship with CAC. So our partnership in adopting this sister-church is fruit of this working group and an added blessing.

Why does this matter? Throughout Scripture, from Genesis to Revelation, God encourages his people to reach out to those from other tribes, people groups, and lands. This is dear to God's heart. I (L.J.) like to say that God is calling us to be World Christians. You can learn more about this by reading, Mission in the Old Testament: Israel as a Light to the Nations by Walter Kaiser, or anything by Dr. Charles Van Engen, Professor of Biblical Theology of Mission at Fuller Seminary.

What can you do about it? Mark your calendars, May 3-5, for Third's annual mission conference! The theme of our conference is Called as Witnesses (Isaiah 43:10) and it will be hosted by CAC and Third. We'll explore together the call to witness and the cost of witnessing, specifically in the country of Egypt. Several members from both Third and CAC have spent countless hours planning and we want to extend a warm invitation for you to engage with us.


MISSION PARTNER UPDATE

Two decades ago, Bob served in Gov. George Allen's Cabinet and later as Deputy Attorney General. Our lives in Richmond were wonderful. We loved Third, but our hearts were restless. There were so many believers here in America, yet still millions "from every tribe and language and people and nation" who'd never heard the Good News. Was there someway that we, ordinary laypeople, could help the Church grow more? And so our launch began. Third commissioned us in May 2000.

Since then we've seen God work across Asia, from Mongolia to Nepal to Sri Lanka. Our colleagues are pastors from 15 countries, working to equip and release young pastors so the Church can grow. We've wept with them in persecution and rejoiced as they stand strong in countries like Bangladesh, Myanmar and Cambodia. These 19 years in Asia have been a great gift to us.

From 2000-2007, Bob taught in major law schools in China about the foundations of the rule of law in the West. We went to China with specific objectives, but in the process, China changed us! In Beijing, God gave us China hearts. We fell in love with the people who received us and we returned home to RVA as different people. As we stood by and prayed, God did great things. He introduced us to urban house church pastors, folks who didn't want to be found in 2000. Devastated by Tian'anmen Square, many students and faculty were searching for what was trustworthy. As they found the One True God, the third wave of the Church gained momentum in China. We learned God can use anyone, even unlikely white folks who didn't speak Chinese well.





He gave us front row seats as the urban church began to grow, just like in Acts 2. Those who were sharing Good News with their friends in 2000 grew into a band of brothers and sisters whose influence would spread across the Middle Kingdom. Our calling was to love and come alongside these young pastors and their families, sharing the "emotional bounty" that God had given us.

We can't *thank you* enough, Third Family, for your faithfulness in praying, loving and standing with us these 19 years! Thank you for sending Steve Hartman and Nelson Ould to teach there. God has used *you* as you've blessed his body in Asia as well as in America. Many of you have hosted and welcomed students for 10 years of Mid-Autumn Festivals and invited them back to your homes for dinner. Some of you have been conversation partners, or spoken at bag lunches with PhD students, or given baby showers. We hope you'll continue in these friendships. We hope to...but as volunteers, traveling and encouraging VCU alumni across the US and in Asia.

God is always reaching out to people, all around the world. He invites each of us to invest our "one wild and precious life" in his adventure. There are families and generations who will be changed forever because they've met the One True God. May we all be faithful to the end as we follow Jesus and love one another.

A LETTER FROM THE DEJARNETTE FAMILY

Dear Church Family,

It's hard to believe that a year has passed since Rick's accident; harder still to believe he has made such a strong recovery in such a relatively short period of time!

We cannot thank you enough for the steadfast love and care you have showed our family over this past year. When Anna first stood in the ER and heard the extent and severity of Rick's injuries – seven broken bones in all including his neck and back - she didn't know how she was going to survive. Yet within moments we were surrounded by family and church friends. Lyric Hassler met Anna in the waiting room of the ER and was a life saver in so many ways. Corey showed up shortly after and came to visit in the hospital regularly. Many more of you stopped by and blessed us with your conversation, care, gifts, and prayers.

After being in the hospital for a week, the nurse told us it was time to go home. We nearly panicked. How was Anna supposed to care for a hospital-bed and wheelchair bound husband AND care for our two young boys? Yet when we got home, a meal train was already in place five days a week. Words can't describe how much each meal and grocery delivery meant. Further still, Josh Bishop volunteered to build us a wheelchair ramp for free so we didn't have to buy or rent one. He spent a Saturday away from his family to selflessly serve ours.

Over the next few weeks, people we had never met at Third sent checks to help us survive the financial stress of the accident. Many more sent encouraging notes and Scripture verses. That kind of support was completely unexpected and reminded us of God's faithfulness and his desire to meet all our needs.



Thank you for your overwhelming generosity, love, and support. It not only ministered to our family during a critical time, it was also an incredible witness to our unbelieving friends who came to visit and learned about your love and care for our family.
