LETTER FROM COREY

Dear Third Church family,

Lent is the period of the year in which we prepare to celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ at Good Friday and Easter. Just as we carefully prepare for big events in our personal lives, such as a wedding or graduation, Lent invites us to make our hearts ready for remembering Jesus' suffering and celebrating his resurrection.

Lent (which begins February 14) is a season in which we especially focus on examining our hearts, confessing our sin, and reflecting on the significance of Christ's death. Think of it as sort of "spring cleaning" of the soul. Of course you need to sweep and clean all year round, but you might have a concentrated focus on deep cleaning at special times of the year. Alternatively, the Lenten season is the spiritual equivalent of an annual physical exam; it's a time to take stock of our lives, and the spiritual health of our hearts.

We've tried to keep the Lenten season light on central programming so we can have adequate space in our calendars and lives to be renewed. But we also have some good opportunities throughout Lent that can support spiritual renewal. (More info on the events on pages 6 and 7.)

Ash Wednesday All Church Dinner and Service. Dinner together on February 14 at 5:45 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall, and service at 7:00 p.m. in the Sanctuary. A time for us to gather and begin the season of Lent together.

The Cruciform Life: A Sermon Series on 1 Corinthians. This Lent we'll be moving through 1 Corinthians on Sunday mornings and explore what it teaches us about living a life that is shaped by the cross of Jesus.

How to Be a Tech-Wise Family: A Seminar with Andy Crouch. Join us March 2 at 7:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall. This is a wonderful opportunity to learn about the ways we are shaped by technology and how to reorder our lives so we are shaped first and foremost by the things that bring honor and glory to God, and build authentic community with each other.

THE CRUCIFORM LIFE: A SERIES ON 1 CORINTHIANS

In many ways, there is no book more relevant to our age than 1 Corinthians. The Corinthian Christians lived in a city that was religiously pluralistic, that was preoccupied with prestige and celebrity, and that was obsessed with sex, money and power. The Christians who lived there had become deeply influenced by their cultural milieu and as a result had devolved into pettiness, conflict, division and

immorality. Paul writes to urge them to live new lives that are shaped by the cross of Jesus, a life of humility, sacrifice, and self-giving. His vision of life is a "cruciform," or cross-shaped life—so that the community of Jesus would resemble its Lord.

As we move through Lent, the season of the year when we focus on the suffering and crucifixion of Jesus, we'll be looking at not just how the cross saves us for life after death, but also how the cross shapes our entire life before death as well.

The Big Question of the Series: How does the cross of Jesus shape our everyday life?

SILENT ALLELUIA: A LENTEN OBSERVATION

Lent is a 40-day period of preparation and repentance, a time in which we anticipate the joy of Easter and the celebration of Christ's resurrection. Because of the contemplative nature of Lent, singing or saying the word "alleluia" has historically been suspended during Lent's forty days, a practice that goes back to at least the fifth century in the Western church.

This year Third Church will practice a period of "silent alleluia," suspending the use of the word alleluia in our worship services from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday. On Easter Sunday, April 1, the alleluias will return and we will sing and say alleluia with great joy and celebration, including the ringing of bells! We hope this will be a meaningful time of contemplation for our community and a joyous celebration on the first!

2018 STAFF SABBATICALS

Sabbaticals are an investment for the future meant to refresh those with ministry responsibilities and to strengthen the church. Our ordained pastors and Ministry directors are provided a sabbatical, with full pay every seven years. Pastors can take three months away and Ministry Directors six weeks. 2018 will be a key year for refreshing our staff with four sabbaticals planned.



KIM TAULBEE has been on staff for 14 years and will be on sabbatical from Jan. 22 to March 4. In addition to time for spiritual renewal, he plans to attend the Calvin Institute of Worship in late January and record scores for original songs that Third has been using in worship to be available to other churches. In the meantime, you'll be seeing more of Brooke Winters, a year-long worship intern who will be leading worship more frequently.



COREY WIDMER will be on sabbatical from May 1 to July 31. Corey has been on Third staff since 2005 and has delayed his eligible time away since 2012 out of concern for the needs of East End Fellowship and the transition to Senior Pastor at Third. His time away is long overdue and with the addition of new staff and the completion of the work of our five Working Groups, we are in a strong position for him to take a needed break. In addition to rest and refreshment, Corey will be working on his PhD thesis.



RICK HUTTON will also use time away for refreshment and to read and write for his DMin. thesis. Having been on staff at Third since 2004, he will be on sabbatical from June 3 to Sept. 3.



TOM BARILA is also planning time away late in 2018. He has served Third for 20 years and is still finalizing his plan for the sabbatical in the late fall of 2018 with the possibility of overlapping into 2019.

Be in prayer for our staff as they take these extended breaks from the rigors and demands of ministry. Ask the Lord for rest and refreshment, both physical and spiritual, so that each person returns strengthened with new energy for providing leadership at Third. Pray as well for the benefit for their marriage and family life.


STUDENTS AND CHAMPIONS NEEDED!
