

THE LANGUAGE OF PRAYER: LEARNING TO PRAY THE PSALMS

Dear Third Family,

Growing up in the American evangelical sub-culture, it was a given that prayer was easy and everyone should know how to do it. For years I believed that praying rote and prescriptive prayers was for people who didn't have the creativity and insight to pray their own prayers out of their hearts. Prayer is just "speaking your heart to God," right? Be confident. Just speak what comes out. What could be easier?

Over time, however, I began to see some problems with this idea. It all just began to feel a bit presumptuous. How do you know how to talk to the God of the cosmos? Is it even right to think you can address the Lord of the Universe like you address your best friend? In Scripture, oftentimes when people attempt to address God, they faint, fall, or die. Even when the disciples were with Jesus, they were so overwhelmed by the power of the reality of God, so in awe of Jesus' intimacy with the Father, that they realized they had no idea how to pray (Luke 11:1).

The truth is, when it comes to prayer, simply speaking your heart is not enough. We need to be instructed. We're just like children who need to be taught how to speak. And how do children learn how to speak? By being spoken to. It takes literally years of listening before we can learn to respond. And in the same way, we must learn how to speak to our Father by having our Father first speak to us.

For this reason God has given us the Psalms, the book that Christians throughout the centuries have dubbed "the prayer book of the Bible." The people of Israel used these prayers in corporate worship. Jesus and his disciples sang them (Mt. 26:30). The early Christians prayed and sang them (Eph. 5:19, Col. 3:16). In the Reformation, many traditions threw out the hymns and solely sang the Psalms. Even Jesus Christ, who

of all people we would expect to "just speak his heart," prayed the Psalms in his most trying moments, in the garden (Psalm 22) and on the cross (Psalm 31). God's people seem to have understood for millennia that the Psalms are not just God's Word to us, but they are also God's Word for us: God praying on our behalf and through these prayers, teaching us how to pray.

This is a radical departure from my Pray-What-Comes-Out-Of-Your-Heart approach. As Dietrich Bonhoeffer put it, "The richness of God's Word ought to determine our prayer, not the poverty of our hearts." In contrast with praying beginning with speaking, the Psalms suggest that all prayer begins with hearing. Prayer is not initiating speech with God, it is responding to God's own speech to us.

This rang true for me during a season of deep spiritual drought. As a young adult I found it increasingly difficult to pray anything meaningful. Time alone in silence left me feeling more overwhelmed than refreshed, for when the noises turned off I experienced a barrage of worry and preoccupation. I found that though I had been a Christian for many years, I increasingly felt like I did not know how to pray. I sometimes wondered if God was there at all. But during this time, a mentor taught me how to pray the Psalms, and the practice revolutionized my prayer life. I realized I needed to learn how to speak to God, how to respond to him, and even how to understand my own emotions and experiences through his Word.

In this summer series on the Psalms, our prayer is that you not only learn about what God is saying to you through the Psalms, but in turn you learn how to use the Psalms to speak back to him. In doing so, you will find a beautiful conversation taking place as you respond to the One speaking to you in love.

The Psalms are not just God's Word to us, but they are also God's Word for us.

MISSION PARTNER UPDATE

The "Q" family has been partners in Missions with Third almost as long as Third has had a Missions department. Working with Wycliffe in the Philippines, they started on the remote island of Palawan, living in a palm-leaf hut, translating the New Testament into Agutaynan. In the almost 30 years since then, they have seen responsibilities

and locations shift—most recently to Manila, where Steve has been Global Scripture Access Services Director and Janice has worked at Faith Academy the largest missions kids' school in Asia. Man, we love this family!

Dear Family at Third,

I write this on the day before we leave the Philippines. We've been back here four years, happily corresponding to Daniel's high school career. Leaving the Philippines a second time isn't quite as hard as it was leaving the first time (after 24 years). Still, it's not easy. At Daniel's graduation we heard some good advice: "Don't cry that it's over; smile that it happened." So we are smiling now with gratitude in our hearts and many good memories behind us. God has been faithful.

We've lived in four different furnished houses over the past four years, moving every year. That means we can fit most of what we want to bring back with us to the USA in our

luggage allowance...and the rest, well, it just won't come. We've had some good recent opportunities to say goodbyes to special people and places. One highlight on a journey back to the neighborhood in Palawan where Betsy spent some early childhood years was when our boatman asked if we had an Agutaynen New Testament with us he could buy. I was happy to give him one as a gift, with a note referencing Acts 20:32: "Now I commit you to God and to the word of his grace, which can build you up and give you an inheritance among all those who are sanctified." The next steps involve finding our way back to Grand Rapids, Michigan—and leaving a week later for the trip of a lifetime. Janice and I are going on a hiking tour of Jordan and Israel. We're fulfilling a dream, marking the likely end of our years living overseas, and celebrating 35 years of marriage six months early.

After that, we'll have a little time to regroup and to reconnect with family and friends and our sending organization, Wycliffe USA. Assuming our financial support level is up to what it should be, I hope to begin working again full-time in mid-August continuing in the same role as Global Scripture Access Services Director. Janice's next assignment is yet to be determined. Daniel is planning on a gap year to make some money and figure out what comes next in terms of career.

Thank you so much for your continuing prayers and financial partnership with us in the work of making the message of the Bible accessible to the peoples of the earth in languages that speak to their hearts. May we find the Word of God ever close to our own hearts, that we may obey it and receive the life he offers to all who come to him (Deuteronomy 30:11-14).

FIVE BOOKS ON PRAYING THE PSALMS

PSALMS: THE PRAYERBOOK OF THE BIBLE, by Dietrich Bonhoeffer (Fortress Press, 1974).

A classic theological exploration of the psalms and the nature of prayer.

ANSWERING GOD: THE PSALMS AS TOOLS FOR PRAYER, by Eugene Peterson (HarperOne, 1991).

Peterson offers some wonderful reflections on prayer and how the psalms serve as a practical tool for prayer. PRAYING THE BIBLE, by Donald Whitney (Crossway, 2015).

A powerful little book that very practically leads you through a way to pray the Bible. Not specifically about the Psalms but very applicable.

GOD'S PRAYER BOOK: THE POWER AND PLEASURE OF PRAYING THE PSALMS,

by Ben Patterson (Tyndale, 2008).

After a nice introduction on the psalms, Patterson actually picks out about half of the psalms with prayer commentary to help you creatively pray the psalms.

THE SONGS OF JESUS: A YEAR OF DAILY DEVOTIONS IN THE PSALMS, by Timothy and Kathy Keller (Viking, 2015).

A wonderful daily devotional in the Psalms.
