

### LETTER FROM DEREK

### Dear Third Church family,

"In the day-to day trenches of adult life, there is actually no such thing as atheism. There is no such thing as not worshipping. Everybody worships. The only choice we get is what to worship."

David Foster Wallace

One of the remarkable things about being a human being is that we were created for worship. It is in our spiritual DNA. At all times, in all ways, we are always worshipping. We are always giving ourselves over to, deriving our significance from, finding our worth in someone or something. We were created for worship.

The tragedy of the human story is that sin has distorted the aim of our worship. The biblical word for this is idolatry. Whenever image bearers seek life, significance or flourishing in someone or something other than God, an idol is born. And every time I take a good created thing, and then invest it with a greatness reserved for God alone, I worship falsely. If we are honest, the entire landscape of human life is littered with such idols. Sex. Money. Power. Fame. Security. Nationalism. Politics. Technology. Family. Marriage.

So what is God's response to a world of disordered worship?

The Ten Commandments, and Exodus 19-20 in particular, give us a glimpse into the answer. The first five books of the Bible, called the Pentateuch, stand not just as theological history nor an ancient legal code, but as a polemic against the false "gods" of the Ancient Near East. So, God's answer to a world of disordered worship is a people and a life. His covenant people. His covenant life. For the blessing of the world. (Gen. 12:3)

### SABBATICAL REFLECTION

The word "sabbatical" comes from the Hebrew word shabbat and the Latin word sabbaticus, and literally means "ceasing." Closely linked to the command of a weekly sabbath, a prolonged period of ceasing was common in the ancient life of Israel, such as the agricultural rest given to a field every seven years (see Leviticus 25).

At Third, the elders have a policy in place that gives pastors a three-month sabbatical every seven years. Although I have been employed by Third for over thirteen years, I've never taken a sabbatical, thinking that I didn't really need it. But after three-plus years of hard work as your Senior Pastor, I admit that I am now happy to receive this grace!

Sabbaticals are not extended vacations or a time for professional development. In the deepest biblical sense, it is a time of ceasing. It is a time to stop what one normally does, which in my case means to stop all preaching and pastoring and writing and leading and visioning and strategizing. Instead, it is a time to rest, to be more deeply present to God, to my family, and to creation, and to attend to parts of my calling outside my everyday work.

I'm ordering my sabbatical around Jesus' interpretation of the famous Jewish shema in Mark 12:30: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength." I hope to cultivate those four areas of my life in the following ways:

- Mind: I will continue to work on my PhD dissertation, which I've been working on for several years.
   Don't worry, I don't plan to over-do it!
- Soul: I will renew some important spiritual habits and disciplines, such as longer times in prayer, Scripture meditation, solitude and silence.
- Heart: I'll spend lots of time with Sarah, our daughters, and other close family and friends.
- Strength: I hope to sleep well, exercise well, and be in the outdoors a lot.

Thank you for the gift of this sabbatical for my family and me. Pray that the Lord would use this time of ceasing to bring renewal in all of us. We'll see you again in August!



**May is National Foster Care Month!** Did you know that there are 5000 children in foster care in Virginia. 700 of these children have parental rights terminated and are waiting for a forever family. In 2016, 464 children aged out of the foster care system before becoming adopted. Henrico County has 92 foster children and just 45 foster families.

What is Foster Care? The goal of a foster family is to provide temporary care for a child with the goal of reunification to the child's biological family. The child's plan for permanency may change to a goal of adoption, leading to an opportunity for a foster family to adopt the child. However, it is important that foster parents enter into care with the primary goal of seeking reunification of the foster child with their biological family.

For the month of May, Forgotten No More is partnering with Hope Tree Family Services, and will be encouraging us all to learn more about foster care and how we can support foster care children.

Are you interested in learning more about foster core or supporting the several families within our church community who are praying about becoming foster or adoptive parents? Here are some ways to learn more this month:

- Join us on **Thursday, May 17** @ **7pm for the next FNM Fellowship.** We'll discuss how to provide practical support, share personal stories, and pray for one another as we seek the Lord.
- On **Sunday, May 6 and 20**, we'll tie blue ribbons around the courtyard to represent the number of kids in foster care in Virginia. Come see the ribbons inbetween services and talk more with our FNM team.
- In our children's Sunday school classes, we're creating snack bags for a foster kids' movie night, and making journals
  for older foster children.
- We will also provide a way for you to pray for children in foster care throughout the month.
