



And the grace of our Lord is wastefully generous. God could have made one kind of bird—instead he made 10,000 species of winged color. He could have made food taste all the same, supplying our need for daily nourishment—instead he created an environment that can produce the likes of curry, jambalaya, and apple pie. He made a world where ants build hills, water falls from the sky, and leaves change colors and regenerate in a matter of months. There is enough wonder and delicious diversity in our world to keep a person in awe for a lifetime. \bigcirc



The degree to which we are aware of this truth is a measure of our gratitude. Plenty of people notice our world, but gratitude goes beyond observation to receiving reality as a gift. It was the original lie of the serpent that God is distant and uncaring, and that we humans should go it alone. This is still the lie that humans believe; in fact, in our culture we are taught that independence and self-sufficiency make for the good life. But the truth is the opposite—dependence on the all-sufficient Father makes for the good life. The grateful person lives in total awareness and reliance on the Father's good gifts every moment.


A breakthrough came for me when I realized that gratitude is not a passive disposition but a learned habit. It is a discipline of awareness to the Father's grace and our own response to it. Paul commands, "Give thanks in all circumstances." (1 Thess. 5:18). Or just simply, "Be thankful" (Col. 4:2). I think I always considered gratefulness as something that *happened* to you when a happy, positive circumstance occurred. But Paul suggests exactly the opposite: the discipline of gratitude in the midst of any circumstance leads to joy. It is not the happy person who is grateful—it is the grateful person who is happy, whose eyes are open to the abundance of all things.

So how has this changed my life? On waking, I let my first words be words of thanksgiving. "Thank you Father, thank you Son, thank you Spirit..." Waking from sleep and having a new day to live in the mercy of the gospel is an amazing gift in itself. Then, throughout the day, I look for cues that prompt thanksgiving. My friend Bob Stamps taught me a simple prayer to utter every time you experience even the smallest good: a text from a friend, a sip of coffee, light filtering through the trees. "Hear the praise of this grateful heart" is a prayer that I now use innumerable times throughout the day. Before bedtime, I try to conduct a brief review of the day, what some have called the practice of "Examen." Doing so helps me remember the gifts of the day and to close my hours with thanks. I don't always keep these habits, but even the sporadic discipline of gratitude has awakened me to the Father's love and the gift of ordinary life. As Diana Butler Bass writes, "Everything is a gift. The degree to which we are awake to this truth is a measure of gratefulness, and gratefulness is a measure of our aliveness."

Want to be more alive? Cultivate gratitude. "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, his love endures forever!" (Psalm 107).

In an effort to provide more exposure into how things run in our Missions Department, we've run a series of pieces giving the Third family a bit more insight. The last feature ran in August, if you need to catch up!

For our last article in this series on our mission budget process, we're going to look at how we wrap up the year. Now that our budget is set for 2019, we begin to delegate one-time gifts for our mission partners from remaining funds in our 2018 budget (so, that which is not designated as regular ongoing support). We've asked our mission partners to tell us about their special project needs, such as where they might need additional funds to complete ministry tasks, buildings, special items needed to better serve their community, etc. Throughout the close of 2018 we'll collect these special requests and categorize their importance by the date we received them and how their project aligns with Third's mission goals. We'll set a dollar amount on each request. Then we'll begin to categorize them by importance. If we receive additional funds at the end of the year, we'll have projects already lined up where we can distribute funds. If for some reason we have a shortfall this year in our budget, those of highest priority will receive funds and we'll try to help the others with 2019 funds instead. It's quite a juggling act, but we feel so grateful to share the blessing of financial giving with our well-deserving mission partners.


As we begin this year's stewardship focus, I'd like to draw your attention to the opportunity you have to give here at Third. Remember 30% of our giving goes directly to missions! THE CHRISTIAN ARABIC CHURCH (CAC) dedicated their new building in Crozier, Virginia in late September. Leaders from various congregations attended the official grand opening. On Saturday, September 22, we had the privilege of hosting a CAC/Third dinner that included a special presentation from the Rev. Andrea Zaki, Ph.D. Rev. Zaki works in Cairo as the General Director of the Coptic Evangelical Organization for Social Services, and serves as president of numerous other organizations. On the evening of September 23, Rev. Zaki preached at the building dedication. There were several presentations and mini-sermons by prominent pastors from various multi-ethnic congregations. Corey Widmer was a featured presenter and I, LJ, had the privilege of offering a prayer of dedication over the building as well as their mission efforts both locally and globally.

What does this mean for our relationship with CAC? Is CAC leaving their Third home? No! Pastor Fakhri Yacoub describes their new building as their second home, and they still consider Third their first home. Now they are able to expand their reach though, through special events in Crozier. They hope to provide more opportunities for children's sports and special services. CAC is thankful for the 20 years they've shared the Third building and they want to return the favor. They've opened up their new facility not only to Third but also to a Russian-speaking congregation, which now meets at the building. Just as Third extended hospitality to CAC, so they are now extending hospitality to both Third and others. We celebrate with them!

ONE DAY. ONE VOICE. ONE PURPOSE.


"God sets the lonely in families." Psalm 68:6


