



I still remember where I was the moment my perspective on financial stewardship changed forever. I was sitting in the office of Kenneth G. Elzinga, a Professor of Economics at the University of Virginia. To say I was intimidated would be an understatement. Ken was a living legend. He had taught twice as many students during his tenure than any other professor at UVA. I was barely 26 years old. As the new InterVarsity staff worker at UVA, Ken had invited me to meet him at his office, then proceeded to ask me what I thought about raising support from people like him. No pressure.

There across a round black wood table, we began talking about fundraising and the struggle I had with asking for faith pledges. Ken listened well. Soon he began to gently challenge my fear of asking new donors to pledge specific amounts to help meet our annual budget.

During a pause in the conversation, Ken went quiet. His hands folded in front of his face, index fingers resting on his chin while his eyes darted left and right in thought. Then with eyes squinted almost to a close, and he said: "Derek, if you don't tell me your need, and if you don't tell me how I can give financially to meet that need, then you are robbing someone like me of the opportunity to worship. Because you see, as a Christian and an Economist, in that order, it is my joy to give sacrificially to the work of the Kingdom."

I had committed a classic mistake common to new fund-raisers. I was too focused on myself. My fiscal need. My fear of failure. My fear of rejection. My desire to avoid awkwardness with potential donors. Me. Me. Me. Do you know who I wasn't thinking about? Ken. At this moment, Ken was trying to tell me the act of giving not only blessed him but was central to his discipleship.

It was a transformative conversation. It not only changed my approach to fundraising as an InterVarsity staff, but more so it changed my heart for giving as a follower of Jesus. As we enter faith commitment season, here are some reflections people like Ken have taught me about how our giving is central to our discipleship.

Giving connects us deeply with the vision and mission of the church.

When we give financially to the work of the church, we participate in the church vision and mission in a new way. Vision and mission are so central to the life of God's people that without vision we perish and without a mission, we lose our way (Prov. 29:18; 2 Kings 21:1-9).

One of the things I love about new models of entrepreneurship, such as Kickstarter, is the way they meaningfully connect individuals to the development of new products they believe in and care about. Two of the main reasons why financial backers Kickstart a project is 1) they want to be a part of something bigger, and 2) the product reflects their values. That is just another way of saying people Kickstart products to connect deeply with the vision and mission of the company.

If that is true for people who give sacrificially to fund a smartwatch, a travel cooler or my favorite Kickstarter of all time — the card game Exploding Kittens, how much more should that be true for those of us who give to the work of the Kingdom of God?

Giving reveals what we love as ultimate.

As we have learned recently in our sermon series Disruptive Grace, one of the things that God's grace does for us is that it reveals the idols of our hearts. Idols are good things that become bad things because they have become ruling things in our lives.

In Matthew 6:24, Jesus puts it this way, "No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money." Because our wealth can be put to so many good purposes, it can be particularly difficult to discern when money has become an idol for us. I don't know anyone who would openly say, "Why yes, I serve money."

Surprisingly, this is especially true for those of us who make less or those of us who are new to the idea of tithing. Sadly, it is possible to worship money even when you have little to none of it. I love what Henri Nouwen says about this, "Whether we have much or little is not important. What matters is that each of us has the potential of making what money we have available to God." Here are a few good questions to ask when looking at your budget: What does this budget say about our faith? What does it say about what I value? Does this budget reveal what I love most?

Giving can teach you how to trust God as a family.

One of the most powerful aspects of making a faith commitment is that it allows the entire family to participate in the family's financial discipleship. If we want to raise a generation of children and grandchildren who love God and who embrace a counter-cultural life of God-dependence, what better place to start than talking about our money together as a family.

God is not opposed to sound investment principles or establishing a proper work ethic in our kids. But it is not his priority. The first context of wealth in Scripture has always been worship. God is the provider of all wealth and he gifts that wealth in grace to his people. Humans made in God's image offer some of that gifted abundance back to God sacrificially in loving, joyful worship. Considering a faith commitment reminds us that we do not trust in our ability to provide. We are all but dust, and to dust, we shall return. Instead, we trust in God's gracious provision for all of life.

Now I know that in the south there are two things we never talk about: family and finances. I am suggesting that the Gospel invites us to talk about both, freely and with grace.

Giving can help create community.

This is a little more radical, but not when compared to the early church. In Acts, the early Christians pooled all their material resources into one pot and dispersed those funds to each family as they had need. Now that is radical. What I suggest here is that we consider inviting other Christians we trust into our faith commitment discernment process.

Many of us are single and do not have a spouse to process with. Many of us have never tithed regularly before and have no idea where to start. Some of us feel like we are two steps from financial ruin, but no one knows how bad it is. Even if you process your faith commitment as a family unit, don't process it only with your family.

No matter where you are in your journey of financial discipleship, let this month be the first month you involve others in this crucial area of your life. It is okay to ask for help. It is okay to be ignorant. It is okay to invite correction. It is okay to need support. But it is not okay to be silent and suffer alone. "Bear one another burdens and thereby fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2). Take the risk, in faith, to ask a few trusted friends in your Parish Group or Bible Study to help you hear what God is saying to you about your generosity. And when someone asks you for help, don't judge them. Rather, gently offer the advice and encouragement and accountability they need to take the next step towards health. When we do this, we fulfill the law of Christ.



FAITH COMMITMENT SUNDAY IS NOVEMBER 3

On this day, we as a church make commitments to the Lord with our finances for the upcoming year, trusting that he will provide for us and take care of us. Making a financial faith commitment for a year is a radical act of dependence on the Father, and we believe it is a key way we learn to how to be faithful and mature disciples.

God invites us into a new relationship with our wealth by giving.

Finally, the call to commit our wealth to the advancement of the Kingdom of God is itself a kind of conversion. It isn't just a new way of thinking about money, it can feel like an entirely new way of being. This is because it will require faith in God, his grace and his upside-down Kingdom. Giving is nothing less than God's invitation to redefine the fundamental ways we relate to our wealth.

That brings me back to Dr. Ken Elzinga. This is what challenged me most about him. Ken was the first man I met who had a redeemed relationship with his wealth. God had sanctified this part of Ken's life through a lifetime of submitting his wealth to Christ as a disciple. It was so convicting that it propelled me on my journey to extend the hospitality of God through sacrificial and generous giving.

So, as you consider your faith commitment this year, let me leave you with an encouragement from Dr. Elzinga once again: "We never become poorer by giving to God. We only become richer. As the Apostle Paul says, "You will be enriched in every way for your great generosity..." (2 Corinthians 9:11).

2020 CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

After much prayer, much discussion, and much consultation, we have made some decisions and are ready to move forward.

Sarah and I bought our first home in 2005 when we moved to Richmond. It was a lovely 1200 square foot house in Church Hill built in 1910. We gutted it and renovated it completely. It was perfect for Sarah and me, our little baby girl, and our dog. But ten years later we looked up and realized we were in a different situation. We didn't have one girl anymore, we had four, and they were getting big! The single 6x8 foot bathroom for the six of us was no longer cutting it. We had to make a decision: how do we continue the mission of the Widmer family in this place?

Our first question was, "Are we still called here?" We answered: Yes. So our second question was: "What do we do to this house?" Answer: Make it fit our new situation! So we bit the bullet and added a bedroom and bathroom and expanded the kitchen. We renewed our home so we could continue our mission as a family in that place.

Let me suggest that this is the adventure that we are now about to embark on together! Our church building has served so well as our "spiritual house" for almost seven decades. In this house, thousands of sermons have been preached, tens of thousands of Sunday school lessons taught, hundreds of children have been baptized, hundreds of weddings and funerals conducted, countless community meetings held... too many to recount! This place has been far more than a building. It is the anchor to our weekly rhythms, the common ground of our gatherings, a safe place for our kids to discover the love of Jesus. It's where our spiritual family has been nurtured, encouraged, formed and equipped to carry forth the message of Jesus. This place is our home.

But we're no longer the little family we were in 1956 when this building was built, or even in 1999 when the last improvements were made. So over the last few years, we've had to ask some tough questions. Do we still feel called here? Or should we just move, buy land and build a new building somewhere else?

After much thought and prayer, the Session determined, "We believe God has called us to stay put." The Lord brought us here, he has blessed us here, and this is a strategic location for us to be and to reach all of metro Richmond. We are "called together" here. So the next questions was, "So what do we do to our home so we can continue our mission?"

That has been a huge question that your elders have been wrestling with for several years. After much prayer, much discussion, and much consultation, we have made some decisions and are ready to move forward. We are ready to renew our home so we can renew our mission.

The State of Our Home

Our facility is wonderful and well-used, but stressed and stretched. "The state of the church's buildings and facilities are a concern to the members. There is consensus that they are dated, in poor repair, and not in a state that facilitates future growth." (TAG Summary report, 2015)

Since 2015, Third Church has had 40% attendance growth, the largest growth being among 28-35 year olds, many of whom have children.

Our children's and student ministry spaces are overcrowded and hallways congested. Our mechanical systems constantly fail, there's limited sanctuary access, and many obstacles to accessibility.

The Values Guiding Our Campaign Decisions

The Next Generation, First.

Our best investment is in the future church. We have prioritized the spaces for our babies, children and students.

Loving Our Neighbors.

We have sought to listen to the concerns of our direct neighbors and we want to bless our local community through our renovations.

Growth Beyond Our Building.

We believe the best size church for us to be at this location is around 1500 covenant partners or 1000-1200 worshipers per Sunday. Our plan seeks to create the best facility for that size church, and our growth beyond that will always be through church planting and church multiplication.

Wise Financial Stewardship.

We've tried to balance stretching ourselves while only prioritizing "must-haves" in the plan that make financial sense.



LOCAL MISSION SPOTLIGHT

Changing the Workplace Through God's Teachings

In his new book, Judson E. Childress, Jr., Executive Director and Founder of Needle's Eye Ministries and longtime member of Third Church, not only tells his story about creating a marketplace ministry in Richmond but also provides guidance for persons to change their workplace cultures by practicing their faith on the job. Navigating the Needle's Eye: Forty Years of Ministry to Business

and Professional People describes applying Christian values at work that touch believers and unbelievers. Buddy Childress did not set out to write a book about ministry for marketplace people. In fact, he did not set out to be a minister at all. During college he was planning on a business career. God had other plans.

Buddy watched his father rise from poverty to become a self-made business success. Pursuing similar success seemed a natural focus. Carrying out his plan, Buddy worked for two Fortune 500 companies when a Sunday visit to church to fulfill a promise to his wife was the catalyst that changed his life. A sermon by a young minister just out of seminary touched his heart and made sense of the love of God and the Spirit of Jesus like nothing else in church ever had. This dramatic experience was followed by regular conversations and mentoring with the new minister. As he sought answers to his questions, the person of Christ was no longer a concept to him but became a living relationship, part of his personal life and directing his life.

The change in his life led to selling his home, leaving business, and moving to Massachusetts to attend Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary. After his first semester, over a two-week period, he began to sense that God was leading him to begin a ministry to business and professional people. His wife had also been hearing the same thing from the Lord. His advisor concurred. He changed degree programs in order to better prepare for this unique ministry. Upon completion, Buddy and his wife Laura returned to Richmond and founded Needle's Eye Ministries. The mission statement of Needle's Eye Ministries has not changed: "Connecting marketplace men and women to life-changing faith in Jesus—encouraging them to impact their workplaces and our community with his values, ethics, and love."

Needle's Eye Ministries accomplishes its mission by presenting the message of salvation in Christ, encouraging living out faith in Jesus, providing Christ-centered biblical teaching, small group opportunities, and a variety of other outreach means. Events such as speakers' series with presentations by notable Christian leaders sharing faith stories or addressing current business issues through the filter of faith are part of its programs. Needle's Eye offers nearly 60 ongoing small groups for all levels and stages of work life, from entry level to company presidents to retirees. Each group becomes a source of learning, support, and friendships.

Just as he responded to God's urging to focus on the working world for his ministry, Buddy responded to the urging of a colleague and friend to write a book that would capture the transformational work of Needle's Eye. Navigating the Needle's Eye tells the story of (in Buddy's words) "God's faithfulness to a family, a ministry, a marketplace, and a community. My goal in writing it was to show how He has led and blessed us (our Board, staff, and countless volunteers) in so many ways to serve as His hands and feet in my hometown of Richmond. It concludes with an exciting look into the future of Needle's Eye."

When Buddy talks about Third Church, his eyes light up. Third has provided ongoing financial support for Needle's Eye since 1982, and increased it over the years. But much more than money has been given, Third has been a home for Buddy and his family for years, providing youth ministry that his children benefited from immensely in their formative years. There have been opportunities to serve in various capacities, and lasting friendships have ensued. Several current and past members of the Board of Needle's Eye are also members of Third. Interwoven and multilayered, support by Third Church has sustained the Childress family and has been constant as the ministry has grown.

Third is sending a team of five to Thailand November 3–14 to provide teaching for pastors serving in rural areas in closed countries—or countries where Christian evangelism is unlawful.

Churches in these areas, where congregants meet in secret, are sometimes referred to as underground churches. Fulfilling the Great Commission in these countries is challenging, but not impossible. Some of the pastors will provide teaching for may have been persecuted, imprisoned, or faced torture for preaching the gospel and/or running an underground church. Just because a country is closed to missionaries and churches doesn't mean they are closed to the gospel. The gospel flourishes during persecution; it spreads through relationships, and this is where the phrase "creative access" comes into play. Many of the pastors we'll meet with are businessmen and women who lead churches secretly.

Third mission partner International Cooperating Ministries (ICM) is coordinating this trip and will be outfitting the attending pastors with multiple resources to help them lead their congregations.

HEALING PRAYER ROOMS

What might a doctor, realtor, IT professional, retired college administrator, homemaker, chaplain, and retired pharmacist all have in common? They have witnessed miraculous, divine healing. And they all serve as trained prayer ministers for Richmond Prayer and Healing Rooms (RPHR) housed at Third Church on the first and third Thursday nights, from 6:30–8:00 p.m.

In the two RPHR locations in the Richmond area, prayer partners have witnessed healing for cancer, rheumatoid arthritis, joint, digestive and respiratory problems, some broken hearts, and much more. "Once you've seen divine healing," says one of our team members, "it changes your understanding of God's power and grace."

After all, God's will for healing appears repeatedly in Scripture. The Old Testament contains over forty passages with healing promises (Ex. 15:26, Ps. 107:20, Pr. 3:1-8, Isa. 58:8, Jer. 30:17). And healing miracles were central to Jesus' ministry when He walked with us; the Gospels are filled with 27 of His medical miracles, and many accounts of Jesus – and then His apostles – "healing all who were sick" (Mat. 4:23, Mat. 14:14, Mk. 6:56, Lk. 4:40, Acts 10:38).

RPHR prayer team members are motivated by Jesus' instruction to "lay hands on the sick and they will recover" (Mk 16:18). When we pray for the sick (Mat. 10:1), we see God work in their lives – and in our lives as well.

So if you have a medical challenge, or any other concern needing prayer, stop by the Youth Ministry area, just past the children's library, any first or third Thursday, between 6:30 and 8:00 p.m. – no appointment needed. You will receive prayer from 2 or 3 trained prayer partners in a private room. We share Scripture on God's love, His promises, and we pray for healing. And very often we see it – spiritual, emotional, relational and physical healing. Once you've seen it, you, too, will want to pass it on.
