LETTER FROM COREY

THE GRACE OF GIVING

"But since you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in the love we have kindled in you—see that you also excel in this grace of giving." 2 Cor 8:7

Have you ever received a totally surprising, completely undeserved, generous gift?

I still remember an experience in the early days of our marriage. Sarah and I were on a date in a fancy restaurant for our anniversary. In that impecunious season, a nice dinner was a rare indulgence, and we ordered carefully to ensure we stayed within our budgetary constraints. During dinner we saw some friends of my parents as they were leaving the restaurant, and we chatted with them for a few minutes. Later, when it was time to ask for the check, the server told us with a smile on her face that a nice couple had paid for our dinner and that we owed absolutely nothing.

It was a surprising, undeserved gift of grace. Not only did their gift make us happy and grateful, but it created a desire to extend that same grace beyond ourselves—and over the years we've had a couple opportunities to repeat that same kind of gift for others. Grace begets grace. Generosity begets generosity.

In 2 Corinthians 8:9, Paul mentions the "grace of giving." As he often does, Paul packs multiple layers of meaning into a succinct phrase.

First, "the grace of giving" means that giving is rooted in God's grace for us. "Grace" is mentioned 10 times in 2 Corinthians 8 and 9, and many of those times Paul refers to the gift of God's grace in Jesus, giving us what we do not deserve: forgiveness, mercy, and eternal, flourishing life.

Second, "the grace of giving" means that our own acts of giving flow from an experience of grace. When we experience the joy of God's grace to us, our own generosity becomes a joyful expression of our experience of grace rather than a begrudging duty or obligation.

FAITH COMMITMENT SUNDAY

HOW WILL YOU RESPOND TO GOD'S GRACE? SUNDAY, NOV. 5

WORKING GROUP 1 UPDATE: WHAT'S IN A NAME

Dear Third Family,

About two years ago, Working Group 1 was commissioned as a part of Strategic Planning to Communicate our Purpose—to clarify our vision, who we are, and how we share that with the world around us. As a part of that work, WG1 was commissioned to address **the question of our name**. What role does the name play in representing the mission God gives the Church? How might the name help welcome our neighbors into fellowship with Christ? How might our name be faithful to our history, our culture and our role in the community, yet also effectively call others to Christ?

One hundred and eighty-three years ago, a small group of believers organized to minister to dock workers and sea farers in Church Hill. This mission was commonly called Bethel, and it eventually grew into the church we affectionately call Third Church today.

Throughout her history, Third's mission has been to seek the lost, uplift the hurting, share the Good News, and help bring God's kingdom to this city and beyond by the power and grace of Jesus Christ. The church name along the way has changed, but the heart of our church—and the call for the global church—has remained the same: to steward God's mission in the world.

While our identity and call have remained true in Christ, our name has changed more than once. We've been Bethel, Second Presbyterian Church, Third Presbyterian Church, and most recently Third Church. Four years ago, our church voted to leave and was dismissed from the PCUSA. Besides paying for our buildings, part of the cost of leaving our former presbytery was the forfeiture of the long-held name Third Presbyterian Church. We could legally keep a part of the name, but not all of it.

Because the church was also facing the retirement of beloved senior pastor Steve Hartman at that time, leadership made a strategic decision to keep as much of the former name as we could—as a placeholder. According to Dr. Hartman, whom we recently interviewed, the idea was that God would lead a

new pastor and new leadership to usher in a refreshed vision for the church, and the name should be born from that vision. Thus, in the fall of 2013, Session decided that the truncated name Third Church would be adopted short-term.

WG1 has been researching, deliberating, consulting with experts and praying for months about the possibility of a new name for our church. We have spoken to many of you, and have sought much counsel. We understand that "Third" has deep equity as a name in our community—among those who know her history and identity. It is a cherished name by those who understand all that it holds of the church's history. We wonder, though, whether "Third Church" is the name that would bear the most fruit, going forward. In an increasingly secular and culturally diverse environment, we are asking whether there is a name that could better open the opportunity to tell our church's story—and, more importantly, to tell God's story of grace and renewal.

A name can house feelings, memories, history, relationships, and associations for those who understand and know it. A name can create appeal, draw interest, prompt curiosity, and open the door to relationship. Some names are insider names, and some names seem to welcome all.

As a working group (WG1) of Session's Strategic Planning Committee, we've been in discernment about our name. We presented our findings and recommendations to the larger Strategic Planning team. With their support and enthusiasm, we presented the same to Session, who will make the ultimate, prayerful decision about our name. We pray that you will join us all in seeking God's will in this matter.

Would you please pray with us about this possibility of a name change? Will you pray for Session—for wisdom, boldness and discernment? A name is just one component of who we are and how we reflect that to our neighbors, but it's an important part and one about which people feel strongly. May we honor Christ and seek His will in and through our name!

WORKING 3 UPDATE: GET SET

As we anticipate the January launch of a parish model of church, we are getting ready by praying for God's shaping of our hearts.

We are asking God to grow our hearts first to trust our leaders. Even as these ordained leaders are training in how best to care for the people in their parish areas, the rest of us can be preparing to receive such care.

We are also asking God to make room in our hearts for new or strengthened relationships with those near to where we live—both in the church family and beyond. Jesus commands us to love our neighbors—and to work for their well-being. Even if we don't especially like all of our neighbors, we can by God's help love them!

Prayer and the grace of God's Spirit help us to get ready for this cultural shift towards receiving care and sharing love in our parishes.

Get ready...Get set! We rely on the Spirit to help ready our hearts. Our minds can get set, too!

Why exactly are we going to the trouble of designating parish areas and readying parish groups? We believe that Scripture shows us this pattern for the health of the church—and also for the spreading of God's love and grace.

'Mission' is an activity of God arising out of the very nature of God. The living God of the Bible is a sending God, which is what 'mission' means. He sent the prophets to Israel. He sent his Son into the world. His Son sent out the apostles, and the seventy, and the church. He also sent the Spirit to the church and sends him into our hearts today. (theologian John Stott in Authentic Christianity)

Wrapping our minds around the idea that God wishes to use us in our neighborhoods for His purposes helps us to

get set for the new parish model of church. God is a sending agent! It's daunting and exciting at once to consider that He chooses to send us. He does not do so without equipping and training us, though. Parish groups will be equipping stations and training grounds, as well as happy places for community building and fun.

Does this sound a little scary to you? You are not alone! One of God's names is Emmanuel, God-With-Us. He is the one who gets us set for missional living. And, in parish groups, you will find yourself in loving communities of friends as God cares for you, disciples you, and grows you into readiness for sending.

The main way to "Get Set" is to learn from the Bible how God longs for all people to come to know, love and trust Him...and to let God transform your mind to match His. He intends to change this world for the ultimate good, and we have that news to share—in our parish groups and in our neighborhoods and beyond.

Pray to get ready, and read the Bible to get set!

WORKING GROUP 4 UPDATE: MEET WITH THE ARCHITECTS



After hearing from Working Group 4 back in January and seeing the exciting ideas that emerged from the planning charrette, you may be wondering what has happened since then. The next phase of our infrastructure planning is

well underway, advancing towards a campus masterplan! The campus masterplan will provide Third Church with a roadmap for modifying our grounds and improving our facilities to better serve the church, the church's programs and our neighborhood.

Before we started the Tuckahoe area Charrette in January with Mike Watkins and his team, Working Group 4 interviewed architectural firms to serve as consultants for the subsequent facility design, selecting the team of BCWH and Waldon Studio Architects to produce our campus masterplan. Both firms participated in the Charrette and gained an understanding of our commitment to being a good neighbor in our neighborhood. Working Group 4 has also gathered a volunteer Architectural Team made up of Third







staff, Trustees and Third Covenant Partners who were willing to serve. We are excited that this team, representing a broad cross-section of the church, will be an efficient and effective interface with the consultants. Members of the Architectural Team include: Peyton Cox, Scott Durham, John Grigg, Carrie Henaghan, Rob Lanphear, Ross Little, Sarah Hale, Stephanie Holt, Matt Maio, Andrew Moore, Talia Moore, Peter Samuel, Ed Satterfield, Alan Ware and Bill White.

In May, building on the principles established in the Charrette, BCWH and Waldon started a campus and building assessment process, leading to a written report of our current facility conditions. This report has helped the architectural consultants and Third Church understand both the limitations and opportunities of our current building and site.

This summer, BCWH and Waldon Studio conducted interviews and surveys of staff, program leaders and facility users to better understand how we use the current facilities and where we have room to improve. [Continued]

The architects have also been analyzing the numbers—comparing the space we have with the space we need and allowing for growth. From this analysis, a program document is emerging—a statement of our current and future space needs that will inform the next phase: concept development.

You have several opportunities in October to speak into the planning for our buildings on Forest Avenue; opportunities to share what works well, what doesn't and your hopes for the future. The architectural consultants will host several small group listening sessions to ask questions based on their observations. The small group sessions are scheduled for:

- Sunday, Oct. 1: In the Parlor at 600 Forest Ave. immediately following the 8:45 a.m. and 10 a.m. service.
- Sunday Oct. 1: 6:30 8 p.m. in the multipurpose room of 500 Forest Ave.
- Sunday Oct. 8: In the Parlor at 600 Forest Ave. immediately following the 10 a.m. service and the 11:15 a.m. service.

Please drop in on one of the sessions! If you have input for the architects but are unable to attend, please feel free to reach out to one of the team members listed below.

As we move into the fall, the architects will be developing a range of design concepts for Third to consider on our property. We expect that the options will include limited interventions to address the most pressing facility needs, on one end of the spectrum, and significant construction and renovations on the other. All of the concepts will have advantages and disadvantages to consider and we ask that you keep Working Group 4 and the Architectural Team in your prayers as we seek to discern God's plan for our corner of Tuckahoe.

Once we have draft concepts to consider, we will provide opportunities for Third Church and our neighbors to weigh in on the ideas before we settle on a particular direction. We hope you are excited about this next chapter in our history as we continue to be called together for the renewal of all things through Jesus Christ.

OPERATING BUDGET UPDATE

OPERATING BUDGET UPDATE: PERIOD ENDING AUG. 31, 2017

Summer has ended, the fall ministry season has begun and with hearts full of joy and gratitude we bring you a report of God's faithful provision for Third Church—he has truly given everything we need. From the beginning of this year and continuing through the summer his generosity poured out through you has sustained the work of Third as we endeavor to seek his Kingdom above all else and share it with a world hungry for him.

Through the period ending August 31, the income of the church is greater than the budgeted amount and the expenses are less than those budgeted. The leadership of Third sense God's loving care in the finances of the church and long for you to know it also. In the paragraphs that follow there are caveats to both the income and expense financial positions, but nothing diminishes the grace received in the first eight months of this year!

And our rejoicing is not predicated on just this financial grace, but on the Kingdom work it will accomplish. God's faithfulness, and yours, has allowed the staff and leadership of Third to focus their time and energy on the Strategic Objectives he has set before us—objectives that will result in deeper community at Third; better discipleship and training to equip us for evangelism and mission; and modernization of our aging structure. All this is done with the ultimate hope of being a community that truly loves our neighbors into the Kingdom.

Before we look at the numbers, here is a reminder about how Third's budget is developed. The historical trends in monthly giving (that follow a somewhat predictable pattern during the calendar year) are considered. To the extent possible, spending budgets are adjusted to align with the historical giving pattern, but in certain expense areas (i.e., personnel costs) the costs develop more evenly over the course of the year. As such, it is not unusual for Third Church to operate in an operating loss position for much of the year given that monthly giving is more heavily concentrated in the last few months of the year. The details on the budget follow.

On May 31 we entered the summer months (when giving is historically less than the required amount to cover Third's expenses) with giving \$16,000 ahead of budget and expenditures \$64,000 below. This was a great encouragement as we saw the hearts of God's people responding to his generous grace toward us through Christ. In June giving income fell below budget, but at the end of July we were again \$17,000 above budget with expenditures remaining below budget. Through August 31 Third's offering income of \$1,972,000 remains ahead of budgeted giving by \$16,800, all to the praise and glory of God who provides everything needed.

Seek the Kingdom of God above all else, and he will give you everything you need. – Luke 12:31 (NLT)

At the end of August, Third's expenditures of \$2,131,000 were \$129,950 less than budget. While we know this budgeted money committed for Personnel, Facility Maintenance and Ministry expenses will be spent, we remain very grateful to finish the summer in this positive cash flow position!

We invite you to continue in your faithful giving through the remainder of the year. Most importantly, join us in praising God for meeting our financial needs, just as he meets **all** our needs according to the riches of his glory in Jesus Christ!

STRATEGIC PLANNING

Working Group 1

Presented an updated version of proposed brand strategy and its continued work exploring the possibility of a name change for Third Church.

Working Group 3

A motion was approved unanimously for the following:

That Session affirm and adopt the following Covenant Partner Statement and Questions, which include new profession/reaffirmation of faith questions for new covenant partners and renewal of commitment to covenant community questions for new and existing covenant partners.

There are two goals behind this motion, which are to align the Joining Question more around the ECO's polity, and to emphasize the ECO's emphasis on the ongoing relationship of covenant partners. The questions were used for the first time on Sept. 17 with the most recent Newcomers class.

BUDGET AND STEWARDSHIP

The 2017 Audit review was communicated to Session. Staff received positive remarks by the auditors for new procedures that have been added to more effectively ensure oversight for all expenditures and division of responsibilities by accounting staff.

FEATURED ARTICLE



In late October approximately thirty of our fellow Richmonders who are experiencing homelessness will come to stay here at our church for a week. As part of a network of churches all linked together from week to week, all year round, through Caritas, we have the opportunity to care for our neighbors who are experiencing a housing crisis. These folks who come to stay are among the most vulnerable in our community. They are working hard to get back on their feet and find stable housing for themselves and their families.

As disciples of Jesus we understand that no four walls can be as secure as the shelter of our Savior. No refreshing shower at the end of a hard day can quite compare to the living water that Jesus offers. And yet these things, sanctuary of home, privacy within community, a table for your family to sit around for a meal are all common amenities in most of our lives. Jesus cares deeply about our material and physical needs, the state of our minds and bodies, the way we treat and care for one another.

So we have the opportunity to demonstrate his love through truly ordinary acts of service this Fall. Often as Christians we're desirous of opportunities to change the world for Jesus in powerful and climactic ways. However, most of the requests of Jesus are simple things in which we neglect to see His glory. We often decline the option to obey because we forget His ways are mysterious as He takes our offerings and transforms them into blessings. So He asks of us, "feed my sheep", "give what you have to the poor" and "love thy neighbor" and we may look for more glorious avenues of service because how can something that is as simple and conventional as feeding and clothing people be holy?

Doing a load of laundry is quite routine for many of us, but this time let it be an opportunity to pray for the family that wears the items that you have refreshed. Packing lunches is 'everyday' for most folks, but as we do so for our guests, let it be a chance to pray for their health, for the nourishment of their body and spirit as they carry heavy burdens throughout their day. Making beds and tidying up is a necessary daily chore, but, here, let us make these beds together praying for the peace and security of each head that will rest on the pillows. For the broken-hearted and discouraged whose minds will wander for a while around the corners of "what if" and "how long O Lord" as they try to find their rest each night.



As we take these ordinary tasks of everyday living and offer them to our guests as service, let us also offer it to our Savior as an act of love and gratitude. For what we have, and what we can share with our neighbors.


