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DISRUPTIVE GRACE: A NEW SERMON SERIES ON THE BOOK OF



What comes to mind when you think of the story of Jonah?

Probably a big whale. Or maybe a big fish if you are more zoologically precise. What most of us know about Jonah is what we learned in Sunday School or VBS as children: a funny little story about a guy who got swallowed up and spit back out again. Few of us have reflected on the story much more than that.

Despite the fact that Jonah may be one of the most familiar stories in the Bible, it is probably also among the least understood. Behind the well-known narrative is a powerful demonstration of one of the most important themes of the Christian faith: the disruptive grace of God. The word *disruptive* is key, because the book of Jonah demonstrates that God's grace often comes in ways that can turn our lives upside down.

We see the disruptive grace of God at work in at least two ways in this story. First, God disrupts the lives of rebellious humans as we run away from him. If sin in essence is running away from God, then grace is God chasing us down to bring us back. Jonah does nothing to get back to God; God does everything to get Jonah back to him, including the purposeful use of a hurricane and a giant fish. So many of us can point to ways that some major disruption in our lives brought us to God when we were not even looking for him. God disrupts our lives because he loves us.

Yet the disruption goes even deeper. Some people have pointed out that the book of Jonah is one of the only books in the Old Testament that includes the active evangelization of non-Jewish people. That is true. However, the true object of evangelism in this story is not the pagan but the believer, not the Ninevites but the prophet. Even after Jonah comes back to God, he is still blinded by his ethnocentric vision of the world and his refusal to believe that God could love the people that he hates. So once again, God's grace must disrupt Jonah's life, teaching him how the grace of God extends to those that Jonah would never choose to love.

Beginning September 8, we'll commence a 6-week sermon series on Jonah and God's disruptive grace. This is a wonderful story for us to learn from in an age of deep cultural conflict like ours. In such a time as this, God continues to call us his people to share his grace widely and generously, to all people and in all places. This is a story that has the power to form us into peacemakers, bridge-builders, and grace-agents in the world. Let's pray that God disrupts us with his grace!

Guided Tour of the Bible

Ed Satterfield authored the Guided Tour as short 5 week studies of one section of the Bible. There are 10 studies in all, five for the Old Testament and five for the New. You can join the tour for just 5 weeks and take any study in any order but our hope is that at some point you will take them all. The only homework required is to read a short assigned section of the Bible each day, noting your questions and observations. The 10 Guided Tour classes are: Pentateuch, Historical Books, Poets, Prophets (before Israel's exile), Prophets (after Israel's exile and return), Gospels, Acts of the Apostles, Letters of Paul, Non-Pauline Letters, and Revelation of John.

An Important Update and an Opportunity to Serve

As September swaps out the heat and humidity of summer for cooler, cozier autumn comforts I find myself daydreaming about all that I look forward to around October. Blankets and boots, sweaters and ciders, school field trips and robust autumnal colors...October has so much to offer and it has also been a special time of year in the life of our church as we have hosted our friends at Caritas for many seasons around this time of year.

This year we will partner with Caritas again, but as the seasons change, so has their program. As Caritas works with our homeless neighbors all over Richmond, they are always seeking new ways to better serve their clients. As Caritas reviewed it's mobile-shelter system for families, they started to see the strain of weekly transition on the lives of both parents and children. While host churches (like Third) were wonderfully supportive and provided for all of their material needs for the week, it could not make up for the fact that the model was hard on families having to move every week for as long as it took them to find housing. Children, especially, need stability and parents need to work, both a challenge in the mobile-shelter model.

So, Caritas, seeking the best for their families in crisis, has partnered with Housing Families First, Home Again and the Salvation Army to get families housed faster. These organizations have shelters available that will allow families to stay together in one place until they are able to find permanent housing, which is better for the parents and the children.

Meanwhile, Caritas is taking on more single men and women previously served by the aforementioned organizations and focused on serving them and placing them in housing. The women's shelter is set to open in late spring of 2020 (they are using the mobile-shelter model currently) and the men are served at **The Healing Place**, established in 2006 as a long-term peer-driven residential recovery program.

This fall, Third Church will provide support to the men rebuilding their lives at The Healing Place. This facility houses over 200 clients who work together to do all of the cleaning, maintenance, cooking, and more to have the shelter run smoothly. We will be a part of what is called a "Bridge Week."



THIRD'S "BRIDGE WEEK"

September 28–October 4

In 2019 we will be starting our *Bridge Week* engagement.

- **Prepping lunches:** Four times during the week we will prep lunches (kid-friendly activity) at Third's kitchen. We need a delivery driver each of those four days to get the lunches from Third to The Healing Place.
- Activity Night: We will have an activity night at The Healing Place (participants must be eighteen years or older).
- Cleaning Kits: Finally, we've committed to making 25 cleaning kits for Caritas to give their clients who are placed in new homes so they can have a fresh start. All of the donations will be gathered from September 8 to September 27. Club 56 will be assembling the kits on September 29 and we'll deliver them to Caritas.

Our goal for 2020 is to support a Bridge Week twice a year: once with the men's shelter in the spring and once with the forthcoming women's shelter in the fall—which will offer a variety of ways to serve.

Pray for On October 6, we'll be celebrating World Communion Sunday as a church. Nations

This annual celebration offers congregations a distinct opportunity to experience communion in the context of the global community of faith. The first Sunday of October is a time when Christians in every culture break bread and pour the cup. On that day, we remember that we are part of the whole body of believers. Whether shared in a grand cathedral or a mud hut, on a hilltop, in a meetinghouse or in a storefront, the sacrament of communion is celebrated by Christians in as many ways as there are congregations. World Communion Sunday can be both a profound worship experience and a time for learning more about our wider community of faith.



Our goal on World Communion Sunday is to broaden our understanding of the importance of prayer, to help you pray with understanding for those around the world, and to help you develop a discipline of praying for a hurting world in need of Christ. Please come expecting great things! **Our sanctuary will reflect other cultures.** Fabrics from Russia, Malawi, Finland and many other countries will be woven into a tablecloth for the communion table. These fabric items have been transformed by our liturgical arts team to reflect the oneness of the community of faith across the continents. You are encouraged to wear ethnic clothing you may have acquired on a visit to another country. Our worship service will have a variety of international flavors. You won't want to miss it!

We will also be putting a special focus on praying for the nations in the Fellowship Hall. International Cooperating Ministries (ICM) has loaned us a large map that will cover much of the floor. You are invited to come and pray as you occupy a particular geographic site. Third's mission team will prepare prayer guides highlighting various countries, and mission team members will be available to help you. You can pray individually or as a family using the prayer sheets, prayer guides and apps available. If you'd like to download apps in advance, check out the Joshua Project app "Unreached" or "Operation World" and begin praying now. Third's mission partner booklets can be used as well to pray for our mission partners in the countries where they serve.

We're delighted to be hosting a longtime mission partner on September 22. Here is some info to help better acquaint you with the ministry of the Quakenbushes.

Dr. J. Stephen Quakenbush is Director of Strategic Initiatives (Language Services) for SIL International, the primary partner organization of Wycliffe Bible Translators. In this role, he provides leadership for SIL efforts in the development of resources for Bible translation, and chairs a task force dedicated to helping the global Bible translation movement to respond and adapt to the increasing impact of multilingualism and migration on language communities worldwide.

Third Church has been partnering with Steve and his wife Janice since they first began the Agutaynen translation project in the Philippines in 1984. That New Testament was dedicated in 2004 (you can read or listen to it at <u>bible.com/</u> <u>bible/1124</u>). During their more than thirty years in the Philippines, Janice had several education-related roles—homeschooling their own children and working in schools—and Steve also served as SIL country director for the Philippines and as academic services coordinator for Asia before taking on more global roles since 2009.

Steve has a deep motivation for making the Scriptures accessible to all people, whatever languages they speak, and wherever they find themselves. Steve currently works from Grand Rapids, MI.

Steve will be joining us on **September 22** for interviews in all services. Afterwards, we'll host a luncheon where he will explain more about his ministry and provide updates.

Orthodoxy A Reflection from Kevin Jeffer vs. Stranger

I've been thinking about our series on the book of James, and the importance of orthopraxy (or "correct conduct"). Good stuff — something challenging every Sunday.

As it happens, I'm really big on orthodoxy ("correct thinking") and Reformed theology in general. Can't help it. I went to Calvin University and come from a long line of Reformed folks. And orthopraxy makes me a little nervous, because it can so easily go hand in hand with legalism. (Which our sermons are doing a great job of steering clear of, by the way.)

But what's been most on my mind — during this season of studying James — is that neither orthodoxy nor orthopraxy are solutions in and of themselves. One leads to legalism, and the other to the kind of intellectualism that allows the abuses Corey has mentioned in his sermons.

So what's a person to do?

It occurs to me that the only real answer is in relationship.

Specifically a Love Relationship with Jesus. (Duh! as my son Nick would say). That Love Relationship is what drives right thinking and right action. In fact, the Love Relationship compels both.

Here's a mundane example: when I married Margarete, my Love Relationship with her changed both my behavior and my thinking. To have stayed the same as before would have been, and is, impossible. And the deeper my Love Relationship with Margarete grows, more loving my thinking and actions become. Better not just for me and her, but for all those I come in contact with — children, neighbors, community members.

RIGHT THINKING AND RIGHT ACTING ARE FRUITS OF OUR LOVE RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS.

Same with a Love Relationship with Jesus. The very fact of being in this relationship changes me. And when or if it doesn't, the problem isn't really that my thinking or action has gone off base. It's that my relationship with Jesus is not where it needs to be.

We've been talking about having a "Transformational" faith rather than a "Transactional" one. Right thinking and right acting are fruits of our Love Relationship with Jesus. And that relationship is the goal of our faith.

So that's what I've been thinking. Thank you, Corey, Ed, Derek, and Rick, for your leadership and your friendship. I'll close with this quote that popped up on my Pinterest feed:

"Any fool can know. The point is to understand." — *Albert Einstein*
